

COVID 19 Vaccination

As of March 15, the COVID-19 vaccination is available to all persons who were born in 1941 or before. The Nepean Sportsplex, Halls A & B is the site of the vaccination clinic and will continue to be used as a major vaccination site. You must book an appointment to get a vaccine. If you unsure whether you are eligible, OPH has a <u>Vaccine Screening Tool</u> that you can use to check. You can book an appointment the province at <u>Provincial</u> <u>Vaccine Booking</u>. Caregivers are allowed to accompany the eligible person but are not allowed to receive the vaccine.
