Two Local Writers

The items about Black History Month in St. Mark's Newsletter inspired me to tell you about two talented Ottawa women who have fulfilled their dreams of writing and publishing books. Both Pamela Antoine and Ainalem Tebege were in my pre-pandemic writers' workshop at the Emerald Plaza Library.

Pamela Antoine, born on the twin islands of Trinidad and Tobago, embraced her passion for storytelling when she retired from her health care career here in Ottawa. Her children's book, Tabitha (Ottawa, Baico Publishing, 2020, \$14.95) is a semi-autobiographical story of a young girl's perseverance. Nine-year-old Tabitha's strong, loving grandmother wants her to go on in school, but there, Tabitha is mocked and bullied because of her stammer. Pamela's illustrations make Tabitha a gem. Ainalem Tebeje, a Canadian of Ethiopian background, is a former journalist and public servant. Her novel, My Love Story in Broken English, (Ottawa, Baico, 2018, \$20) is intended for grown-ups. It's about a fourteen-year-old child bride in an Ethiopian village whose kind, progressive husband defends her against her traditionalist enemies in the community. Ainalem wrote My Love Story as a gift to Canada for accepting her as a refugee, and donates all profits from book sales to charity. She is working on a novel about refugee women. Vestry 2021 - February 28 11 AM

The diocese has prohibited in-person vestry meetings of any kind until further notice. Accordingly, our vestry will be held on February 28 at 11 am via Zoom.

We are working through the steps on how to do this.

- If you would like to attend vestry this year, you must pre-register with the office. You will be sent a google form which will contain your vestry declaration and information which will help us manage the meeting. Every person in the household who wants to attend must fill out the Google Form. So if, two people are attending, please fill the form out twice. This is so that we have the vestry declaration for each person and they will be allowed to vote.
- If you have corrections to the reports, please submit the full text by email ahead of time, if possible.
- 3. We are including motions of thanks at the end of the meeting but please submit them to the office ahead of time, if possible.

If you are unfamiliar with Zoom but would like to attend the vestry, or you would like to practice with Zoom before the vestry meeting, please let the office know and we will set up a practice session ahead of time. You can also access the Zoom meeting via phone if you or anyone you know would prefer to participate via phone rather than computer.

Lenten Outreach Projects

At the Parish Council Meeting on January 20, it was decided that the projects for this year's Lenten Outreach would be St Luke's Table and the Diocesan Refugee Ministry.

Lenten Study

The Lenten season will offer 30-45 min. reflection/Bible study via Zoom on Wednesday evenings at 7pm beginning on February 24. We will do a thematic approach to the Collect of the day along with two lectionary readings for each upcoming Sunday of Lent. The readings will be sent to you in advance. If you want to be a part of this exercise, please confirm by contacting the office.

One of the blessings of these strange and unusual times is that time and space are not barriers to participation. Even if you don't live in the city, even if you don't drive at night you are welcome to join in.

World Day of Prayer
