Episcopal Visit in February

On February 9, 2014, St Mark's welcomed Bishop John Chapman, as well as parishioners and clergy of St Michael's and St Richard's, in an historical tri-parish celebration

Will Knight: St Mark's celebrated a special day on Sunday, February 9, 2014 when it we comed the congregations of St Richard's and St Michael and All Angels to worship with the Bishop of Ottawa, the Right Reverend John Chapman. The day was also special for particular members of all three congregations; several reaffirmed the baptismal covenant; others were confirmed as Anglicans; and some were received into the church. From our congre-



gation, Audia Barnett and Kathy Audia Barnett, Fr Brian, Gillian Martin, Bishop John, William Knight, Kathy Joly Joly reaffirmed their faith, while Cillian Martin and Lucare up a condition to the Anglian reminded us that we are both the salt and light of

Gillian Martin and I were welcomed into the Anglican communion.

It was good to see St Mark's pews filled with members from all three parishes. The choir too was larger, supplemented by other choristers. And the Reverend Brian Kauk shared the altar with the Reverend Dr. Linda Privitera from St Michael's and the Reverend Margo Whittaker from St Richard's. Our bishop commented on this when he briefly spoke in his welcoming remarks. He hoped it boded well for the MAP process in which all three parishes were engaged. In his sermon Bishop John reminded us that we are both the salt and light of the world, a commentary on Matthew 5:13-16. His observations on regaining our saltiness and showing our light spoke not just to those confirming and reaffirming their faith, but to all congregation members as they contemplated what MAP means.

After the service, the Bishop posed for pictures with those he had just confirmed, re-affirmed, and received. The large combined congregations made for a lively coffee reception after the service; it was actually hard to navigate around all the little knots of people in Bishop Reed Hall. But it appeared that

> everyone got a slice of cake, thanks to the care of our able coffee servers.

Ministry Assessment Process (MAP)

Wind-up of MAP at St Mark's

As noted in previous newsletters, a number of events have taken place for discussing the Ministry Assessment Process (MAP) and a quantity of information material about MAP has been provided to the parishioners of St Mark's.

On Sunday April 4 there was a special Vestry at St Mark's with the sole purpose of voting on the following resolution:

"It is resolved that St Mark's agrees to move toward the creation of a new parish to be named by the Bishop, in partnership with St Michael and All Angels and/or St Richard's."

After several parishioners spoke to the resolution – some in support and some against – the vote was called, and of the 110 people eligible to vote, 32 voted for the motion and 77 voted against.

Both St Michael's and St Richard's considered parallel resolutions during their annual vestries in February and both voted in favour with large majorities. They have now created an Implementation Council for moving forward together.

The members of St Mark's who were on the MAP Leadership and Discernment Teams found it a privilege to work on this process. It was a very positive and challenging experience.

A letter of thanks and good wishes has been sent to St Michael's and St Richard's.

"How positive it was to get so much closer to the other two parishes with all the joint activities that occurred. Those are relationships that we should continue to foster no matter what the future brings - because the future could well bring us together in a more permanent configuration who knows?"

"Ever since the beginning, Christians have disagreed and gone in different directions, but at the same time they retained their common belief in the Risen Lord. For St. Mark's worship was, is and always will be different than what other parishes want to participate in. Post-MAP we have to concentrate in rebuilding our core values and in doing so will require the full support of our parish. At the root level, love, thoughtfulness and communications are vital in bringing us back together and this can only be done by focusing on the needs within our own parish. We must revitalize our aging structure and our aging community."

GIFT / Stewardship

I came across the following during my daily meditations and thought it would be a loving and gentle way of continuing our faith journey and exploration of stewardship. It is from one of my favourite mentors, Fr. Richard Rohr.

Living in the Flow

If the Trinitarian life flows between us, then every aspect of our lives is something that we can allow, enjoy, and steward. A Trinitarian theology gives you the understanding that you are being guided and you are participating in the Great Mystery. And it has very little to do with you except, like Mary, your "yes" seems to be crucial. It matters. It seems that God does not operate uninvited.

You are a part of the flow. The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—and you too, to the degree you say "yes"—are each perfectly giving and perfectly receiving, without any obstruction to the divine flow. Each person of the Trinity welcomes 100% of what is offered, which is entire and unrestricted. This is called Grace. To simply receive is always a humiliation, yet it is even harder to immediately let go of what you've freely received.

You can live this mystery yourself. Trust love, trust communion, trust vulnerability, and trust mutuality. Always seek to be in relationship, finding little ways to serve others, to serve the sick, to serve the poor who cannot pay you back. Know that your heart is given to you and needs to be handed on, just like the Trinity. And you'll begin to know yourself inside this mystery called Love.

Don't try to work this out too much with your head. Just trust the flow of the most natural, dynamic, and positive energy that's already flowing through you. It will feel like Love.

I look forward to our exploration of our Stewardship journey at St. Mark's and our continued Growing In Faith Together (GIFT) endeavours. In the coming weeks you will get more details about how we are doing and what we are doing with our GIFT contributions.

Nurses: Angels on Earth

"I think one's feelings waste themselves in words; they ought all to be distilled into actions which bring results." Florence Nightingale

Many who have been ill can attest to nurses as "angels on earth". The nurse is usually the one right there on the spot, doing what is needed. Before the foundation of modern nursing, the church (nuns) and the army often provided nursing-like services. Possibly the first nurse in the Bible was Phoebe (Romans 16:1) a deaconess of the early church.

Nurses have had a profound effect on the quality of Canadian life.

1639: Augustine nuns establish a medical mission in Quebec;

1874: Formal nurse training was established at the General and Marine Hospital, St. Catharines, Ontario;

1899-1902: Canadian nurses were sent to the South African (Boer) War;

1901: Nurses officially became part of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps.

Many nurses have left their mark, especially during conflicts. One of the most prominent is Florence Nightingale, (1854 Crimean War). Appalled by the conditions of the hospitals, she became an advocate for hygiene, and a hero throughout the world with her dedication and contribution to the nursing profession.

For a relatively young parish, St Mark's has had a number of nurses who followed Florence Nightingale's example of putting feelings, training, into action. Former parishioners Joyce Fitzgerald (deceased) and Lillian Bowden were both military nurses. We had Joan Whitham, Annabel Griffiths, Eileen Heppell. We still have some former nurses today, including Doreen Craig and Gillian Morris and there's bound to be others.

Nurses may be angels on earth, but in the last couple of years, we have lost three nurses, who have now become heavenly angels. Each in their own way made their mark in our community: Barbara May, Betty Gillham and Gail Stone.



Barbara: The inscription on Barbara's burial site says it all: "She taught us by her life serene what faith and hope and love could mean". Her daughter Marion remembers her as "a quick responder and cool as a cucumber under pressure" when numerous times she was called upon to provide emergency care at local traffic accidents. For many years Barbara and husband George were leaders of the marriage enrichment courses at the diocese. She was a member of the church choir and instrumental in the choir ladies ridding themselves of their mortar boards!



Betty: Where do you start with the many hats of Betty - racing car driver; Girl Guide leader; Head Nurse - Civic Hospital; Public Health Nurse - Ottawa-Carleton School Board; Church Warden; Church Treasurer; Choir Camp nurse; Diocesan Lay Reader; sub-deacon; pastoral care leader; Board of Nepean Seniors' Home

Support; Council on Aging; mother and grandmother to all; maker of cakes; Nepean's Citizen of the Year. Rest in peace, Betty.



Gail: She was a nurse all her adult life, professionally and personally. When not on duty, she would often be found caring for family and friends, and was an early advocate of palliative care, eventually going into private practice. Gail headed our health committee and was instrumental in bringing the Parish Nurse

program to St Mark's. Although never formally a Parish Nurse, she trained at Algonquin with Patti Robillard, St Mark's first Parish Nurse. Gail was a person of deep faith, where prayer and spirituality played a large part. She was one who also put her faith and prayer into action.

These are just a few of our parish nurse angels. Quite often there would be a Sunday incident, someone would faint, and our nurse angels would quietly get in to action with the majority of the congregation unaware there was an emergency.


Although none of these angels were officially what we know today as Parish Nurses, in their day they certainly did many of the things that have now been taken on by our Parish Nurses: Patti Robillard - 2004 -2012 and Janet Helmer 2013 - to the present.
