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## "God's mission in the world" Reflections on ministry

As I write this, I've arrived at what will be my last six weeks in this parish before I move on to St James' Carleton Place. The round of "lasts" has begun: my last Seniors' Service and Luncheon, my last Parish Council, and most recently, my last Vestry.



All these "lasts" bring to mind some of my "firsts" at St Mark's, and along with these ministry milestones, the people I have grown close to along the way. For example, I will never forget the first few conversations I had with Elsie Wilkins.

It was some time after I arrived in early 2008, but well within the honeymoon period, when Elsie asked me at the back of the church after the service, "Are you in trouble yet?"

"No", I replied, "at least not that I'm aware of."

"Oh, well," she said. "That's too bad." The look on my face was, I'm sure, a mixture of puzzlement and nervous laughter. Did she know something I didn't know?

A few weeks later, again the question after church: "Are you in trouble yet?" When I indicated I was still in the good, at least as far as I knew, Elsie encouraged me to "Try harder, it will happen." By now I was curious. What was she up to?

As time went on, and Elsie's mentoring towards mischief continued, I eventually got to the point one day when I could say, "Yes, I think trouble has finally found me, Elsie."

"Good!" she said, with satisfied approval of the situation. "Now, you can get out of it."

Over the years. Elsie continued to encourage me to get both in and out of trouble. I found two nuggets of wisdom in Elsie's serial encouragement. First, that humour is essential equipment in a changing world. Especially the kind of humour that builds one another up, and never seeks

to diminish or tear someone down. Second, that there are consequences to leadership in a community of human beings that cannot and should not be avoided. The best we can hope to achieve is to roll those consequences into the next necessary action, and keep moving on with the task at hand. In this case, the task at hand is God's mission in the world, of which the church is privileged to be a part.

We have shown ourselves to be a parish church that is up to the task in so many ways. 2016 has seen several successful fundraising initiatives and a spring Stewardship campaign, such that the Vestry meeting on June 12 was able to adopt a budget with a much smaller deficit than the one we faced at the beginning of the year. There are still large hills to climb and new ministries to be explored. I have every confidence that St Mark's is up to the task of embracing God's future. My prayer for you all is that God will bless you with that unity of spirit that only comes from the Holy Spirit, the courage and love of Jesus into which we are baptized, and the secure knowledge that it is God alone who gives us grace and peace.

I'm working now to visit as many people as I can before my time at St Mark's comes to an end on July 24th. ## Bishop's Announcement

On Pentecost Sunday May 15, a letter from Bishop John Chapman was read to both congregations.

The letter opened with "Grace and peace be with you on this day of the celebration of the Spirit!" It announced the Bishop's appointment of Fr Brian as Incumbent of St James, Carleton Place effective August 15, 2016. Fr Brian's last Sunday with us will be July 24, 2016.



**Bishop** cont. In closing the Bishop wrote, "In this time of transition please know of my prayers and very best wishes as you remain faithful servants of our Lord Jesus."

#### The Process

Several of us were surprised to find out that we were called the "St. Mark's Official Committee" when called to meet with Archdeacon Chris Dunn, following the Bishop's announcement.

The committee of four is comprised of both wardens and both lay members of synod.

- Sharon Walter, Rector's warden
- Penny Miller, People's warden
- Gillian Morris and Janis Perkin, Synod members.

Fr Chris Dunn wanted to meet with us to explain where we are now and what the next steps would be. We have met, asked and answered questions and we are now waiting to hear from the Bishop's office about what comes next.

Part of this process is the appointment of an interim priest, until a new incumbent is chosen.



# Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart

St Mark's 2016 stewardship financial campaign prompts generous response

Parishioners have pledged more than \$30,000 of additional giving in response to the Parish Stewardship 2016 financial campaign, held during the month of April.

At that time, families and individuals on the Parish list received a stewardship package that included:

† a blank commitment form

† a work-sheet (How to make your commitment)

<sup>†</sup> a revised PAR sign-up sheet, and

† a return envelope

We also asked parishioners to check off all the talents which were currently part of their commitment to St Mark's, and to indicate any other talents they felt could help the ministries of St Mark's, and how much time they could devote to parish activities.

By April 24, people had provided their sealed commitment envelopes, and the Envelope Secretary reports that:

the total number of completed received forms is 55;

\$\frac{1}{V}\$ 8 parishioners have signed up for PAR; and

the total amount pledged for 2016 is an increase of \$33,950 over 2015 general envelope (including PAR) givings.

## Vestry - our deficit is covered

At our annual vestry in February we passed a six-month deficit budget. It was requested that we use the period between February and June to see if there was some way to increase our bottom line before presenting a revised budget in June.

A special vestry, focused on the budget, was held on Sunday June 12<sup>th</sup>. A deficit budget was presented, but the amount of the 12-month deficit had dramatically decreased from minus \$40,630 to a deficit of minus \$14,144. Our cumulative deficit, including \$3,121 from 2015, is now minus \$17,265. There is enough in reserves to cover this deficit, if no additional money comes in.

There was some clarification of the numbers in the draft budget. Questions were asked about the Equalized Cost of Priestly Services (ECOPS). Questions were also asked about the possibility of appealing our assessed Fair Share. (Each parish is required to pay its Fair Share of the diocesan budget, as calculated by the Synod office.)

The motion to accept the budget passed unanimously.

Thanks must go to everyone in the congregation for accepting the challenge to increase their givings this year and to the stewardship group who organized a successful stewardship campaign.

Parishioners committed to increasing their regular contributions on an annual basis, for the most part through an increase in their weekly or monthly envelopes or PAR. For this year, we expect to receive two-thirds of the increased amount, as most people began to increase their contributions in May 2016.

We are still collating the talent commitment data. When that is completed, volunteers who lead the various ministries will be in touch with those who expressed interest in becoming more involved.

A big thank you to everyone who participated in this campaign and committed their time, talent and money! Parishioners' annual commitment will help St. Mark's in our financial planning. Stewardship is an integral part of our journey as Christians.

## **Our Parish Nursing Story**

St Mark's Parish Nursing ministry started as part of a visioning weekend in September 1999, with Marian Chapman and Gail Stone as the main movers. It was to be a new venture in the pastoral and spiritual health of our parish.

In 2001 a proposal was presented at Vestry, and the goahead given to work on a full proposal for Vestry 2002. Vestry 2002 approved a one-year pilot project, on condition that the parish could raise the funds by directed givings. A Steering Committee was formed and by Vestry 2003 the parish had raised funds for at least one year.
