On Sunday, January 28, we started our visioning season here at St Mark's. We officially began a time in which we will focus on the future that we want to see at St Mark's. After the 9 am service about 50 parishioners

gathered in the hall for our first time of discussion surrounding these matters. Thank you to all who came out to participate in this important first step. Each one of you is a vital member of this community that make up St Mark's church and your voice is important. Each one of you brings your unique gifts and vision to bear on where you feel God is calling us to be as a church.

I want to assure all of you that currently we are in good shape financially as a parish. (see Financial p5) We have recovered from our deficit budget and are once again living with a healthy bank account projected for this coming year. That gives us time to make some good, prayerful decisions. We don't have to rush into something that isn't appropriate for our community. At the same time, we need to plan for our future. As our congregation naturally ages we want to be able to decide what kind of legacy we are leaving for future generations. There is time to be intentional, and prayerfully consider how we want to be remembered, how we want to transition into our future as St Mark's Church.

Over the course of Lent we will be using the 5 Marks of Mission as a tool to start thinking about God's call to the church. As disciples of Christ we are called by God to do many things. As a community, we get to focus in on one or two things that we think we do well, whether it is to reach out to the students at Carleton, or help the young families at Debra Dynes. Perhaps it is to expand our music ministry or help isolated seniors by providing social activities. All these things are worthy ways of living out God's call to us. As a community we will listen for God's guidance as we consider where we want to focus our energy.

Here at St Mark's, we are blessed with many gifts and it is important to know what those are so that we build on our strengths. We also will find some areas in which we need to strengthen our resources. It never hurts to have a growing edge, an area we feel we could do better for God's kingdom.

As a community, we have a lot of passion for this building and this worship space. We are a very tight knit group and have a strong sense of who we are. My hope is that as we surrender our gifts to God, we will be blessed. God will guide us and encourage our growing edges. Our strengths will help us find our future. By coming together to pray for God's guidance, we are trusting that there is a purpose for us. God has brought us to this location, in this community, at this moment in time for a reason. We are God's beacons of hope for those who are in need.

Over the next few months we will take time together to pray and ask God to help us envision our future. It is a very important discussion to ponder what legacy we hope to live out in this community. Jesus is with us as we gather to reflect upon who we are and who God is calling us to be. May God bless us in our discussions over the next few months and bring us to a clear, confident path. Our Forty Days in the Wilderness

I was reviewing some of my pictures and came across one of a redwood stump submersed in water. You could see the growth rings. To me our journey with God is like how

trees experience growth.

Some years the rings are thin because the tree was suffering from lack of nourishment and water, the essentials to full growth. Perhaps our thin years at St Mark's are when we struggle with



ministry and mission, being challenged by poor finances and wrestling with our church buildings or even internal conflicts.

Other years the rings are wide and represent times of abundance. It is a time for growth and strengthening. It represents that the tree and other elements are in harmony. Church is like that when we have good mission and ministry, we feel balance. We create opportunities for spiritual growth and enhancing our understanding of what God is calling us to do. This is a time when we can focus on the needs of others and look for opportunities to fulfill our baptismal covenant.

I was inspired by our Primate Fred Hiltz's announcement of his decision to retire. The following is an extract from his letter:

On this Sunday, right on the heels of the Feast of the Epiphany we find ourselves at the Jordan River remembering the Baptism of the Lord. We recall how he insisted that John take him into those waters. We hear again that voice from heaven as he rose up from his transitory burial, 'This is my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased.' (Matthew 3:17). We remember that the Spirit descended and rested upon him like a dove, and then within days drove him out into the wilderness beyond Jordan. There he fasted for forty days and nights.

The evangelists speak of that time as His Temptation in the Wilderness. Many biblical scholars speak of it as a time of spiritual discernment as to the nature of his mission. It was clearly a time of spiritual wrestling, marked by a deepening awareness of his identity as the Servant of God, The Anointed One who would announce good tidings and publish peace, saying to Zion, 'Your God reigns'. (Isaiah 52:7). From those days in the wilderness, he would come in the power of the Spirit into Galilee proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom of God, teaching the people in their synagogues and healing the sick among them.

So began his public ministry.

This is an exciting time but also a time of apprehension and worry. I pray that in our wilderness we will find streams of living water and manna to guide us on our journey.

Praying for Christian Unity

On January 21, St Mark's welcomed clergy and people from two other Christian traditions, the Madonna della Risurrezione Roman Catholic church on Fisher Avenue, and the Dormition of the Virgin Mary, Greek Orthodox church, on Prince of Wales Drive, who joined us in a service of prayer for Christian unity. St Elias Antiochian Orthodox Church on Riverside Drive was unable to participate this year.

This annual service takes place around the world during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, and St Mark's has been part of it for many years. For 2018, the Caribbean ecumenical team chose the Song of Moses and Miriam (Exodus 15:1-21) - a song of triumph over oppression - as the theme for the service, and specifically the verse 'Your right hand, O Lord, glorious in power'. Caribbean history is deeply marked by colonial exploitation, and today Christians of many different traditions see the hand of God active in the ending of enslavement, and as God's saving action which brings freedom.

The service was in English, with hymns in English, Italian and Greek. Rev Jessica gave the homily, and Fr





Antonio and Fr Alex led different parts of the service. Special guest was Greek Ambassador Dimitris Azemopoulos.

Over 150 people attended the service and reception that

followed, including more than 30 from St Mark's. The choir pews were overflowing with choristers from all three churches. The reception followed in the hall, where we shared a great variety of ethnic and traditional food.

Thanks to all who provided food, helped set up, worked the kitchen, and helped clean up. Thanks also to everyone who attended and represented our parish, including 16 senior and junior choir members. This is a very special example of community in action.

Our children are very fortunate to have loving families and their parish supporting them and they are so thrilled to be able to help others, thanks to you.

This will be an opportunity for the children to support St Mark's outreach, with Cornerstone's new housing project. 


Financial Update: We finished 2017 'in the black'

In the November 2017 newsletter I reported that, up to the end of October, expenditures for the year had hovered a little higher than income. However, by the end of December, income surged ahead of expenditures so that, at the end of the year, we finished 'in the black' by approximately \$11,500. This is far ahead of the \$8,000 deficit that had been budgeted for the year.

As can be seen in the graph below, the major reason for total income surpassing expenditures by the end of December was a surge in collection income in both November and December, with expenditures staying very close to budget. Higher-than-budgeted income over the year from other sources, such as fund-raising events, also contributed to the good results.



We are now in a much healthier position for preparing a budget for 2018. Plan to attend Vestry on February 25 to contribute to the discussion and decisions for the year ahead.

And keep up the good work!

It is a very special year for this event – the 50th anniversary! As always, there will be a great display of art from more than 40 artists – both old favourites and new. But plans are afoot to make some changes so that this anniversary show will be extra special. Come out and see!

The annual art show has been a long-time fund-raiser for Circle 2. This year, Circle 2 has voted to direct the art show profits to Cornerstone Housing for Women, to help to furnish a room in a new 42-unit affordable safe housing community on Princeton Avenue.

There will also be a recommendation at Vestry for parishioners to direct their Lenten Outreach to this Princeton project. You can learn more about Cornerstone and Princeton at

Cornerstone-Princeton is a new 42-unit housing community that will provide a comforting home for women who need moderate support. The women who move into this new space in Westboro will be transitioning out of crisis, but will still need some help living in the community.

The Sisters of Jeanne d'Arc have entrusted Cornerstone with the residence they had used as their 'Mother House' for many years. This allows the Sisters to continue their legacy of helping women in need.

Cornerstone-Princeton needs to raise \$1.5 million to make this residence a reality.

St Mark's Parish Council has agreed to support this project, by sharing the cost of furnishing one room with Julian of Norwich church. The cost will be \$3250 to each parish. This will be a proposal at Vestry. Please support it.

Debra Dynes Family House: St Mark's faithfully gives to DDFH during the year. The pre-Christmas giving consisted of the regular weekly donations for their food bank (one of the biggest and most used in the city), and an Outreach donation for unexpected Christmas needs. This was much appreciated as there is always a need at Christmas. The Food Bank will continue to need our donations through the winter, when the Family House gardens are not providing fresh summer produce.

Multi Faith Housing Initiative - 'Tulipathon Walk': Although the walk for affordable housing will not take place until May, please think about whether you might like to support our parish contribution by joining our regular walkers, who proudly carry the St Mark's banner which has twice won the prize for best banner in the walk. If that is not something that you can do on the day, then please consider giving a monetary donation to support our walkers on behalf of St Mark's. The very pleasant walk along the Canal includes many churches and faith groups, all coming together to assist the MFHI, who work to help create safe and affordable housing for those less fortunate than us in our city. More information will be given at services closer to the date of the Walk.



Bales for the North: Coming in the late spring is Bales for the North, a Diocesan drive for clothing and household items which are sent from our churches to communities in the far north.

Mother's Day: Traditionally we donate small gifts to be made available to the children at Debra Dynes so that they may give to their mothers on their special day.

If you see things that might be appropriate for either or both outreach activities, please buy and put away for our spring giving. St Mark's has a reputation for being faithful and generous in our support of these causes. We are a giving church.



St Mark's Breakfast Heads to Jamaica!

The presentation was followed by a lively question and answer period that reflected the audience interest in Jamaica.
