# Welcome Back to St Mark's!

Welcome back from holidays, quiet days, sunny days and recreation days. I hope you all had a break from your regular pattern and took some time to re-charge over the summer. We have a busy fall planned at St Mark's full of interesting new adventures.

Following up from our Visioning day in April and our desire to do more outreach in our community, we have planned a seniors' drop-in program to address the isolation that seniors experience. It will start on Thursday, September 27. Affectionately coined Coffee, Company & Conversation, it

will run from 10 am to 12 noon on Thursdays this fall.

We will also be holding a study about what our faith means to us and how we can share it with others. From the Diocese of Toronto, the program "invited" will prove to be thought provoking and soul stirring. We will be holding the fall study starting on Wednesday, October 3 from 10 am to 11:30 am. It is a seven-week session, with some material to read ahead of each Wednesday. Please register by September 23, so we can make enough copies for everyone.



Making our outdoor space more welcoming was another topic that has created lots of discussion after the Visioning day. Specifically, we are exploring the idea of having a "little free library" (<u>https://littlefreelibrary.org/</u>) and of adding a labyrinth to the lawn. As this is seasonal, we are brainstorming this fall so that we can add to our outdoor space next spring.

Our website is going to be refurbished soon as we discussed wanting to become better at communicating with our neighbours. We will continue to work on being more visible for those living and commuting in this neck of the woods.

This fall you will notice that we have intergenerational services planned. Having the children worshipping with us is very good for all of us. It teaches them about the rhythm and symbols of our faith. It opens us up to finding joy and laughter amid our praises to God. We are blessed to have so many young families in our midst as St. Mark's expands and grows.

Lastly, we will continue to explore the themes that we came up with in April that

will help us to be more in community with each other. We named our hopes to become a vibrant community, that extends love to all, through being people of the table. As we come back together this fall we will gather around the communion table, the Welcome Back BBQ, pot-lucks, coffee hour after church and at the seniors' drop-in on Thursdays. In our time together, we will be nourished by God and each other.

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# Stewardship Your Legacy: We will miss you...

"We will miss you" - it's a statement that can be filled with meaning. It can express a wish that a relationship might continue, uninterrupted, while at the same time, it might be the beginning of letting go of a person held close to one's heart. How often have members of the parish of St Mark's

said, to a fellow parishioner, "we will miss you"? Sometimes it's prior to an absence on a much anticipated trip, sometimes it's when a parishioner moves from the area to be closer to family or to further a career, and sometimes it is in the sadness, at a funeral reception, for a fellow parishioner's passing.

Sadly, the passing of parishioners occurs every year at St Mark's. In each of the past two years, vestry reports noted seven deaths, representing a decline compared to households of about 4% per year. While the

Church continues to attract new parishioners, the ongoing expenses of our Parish (totalling this year in excess of \$200,000) do not neatly match up with the rise and fall of its population. Our collective stewardship of St Mark's covers many elements, including the building, staff and the programs that we have chosen to encourage. Each year we approve a budget at vestry that represents a forecast of the upcoming year's income and expenses. This task matches revenues with expenses, and based on these, we make community commitments within the Church, the parish and to the Diocese at large. As we all know, when we reach out to help in the Church, in our community or around the world, we raise expectations, and if unforeseen events fail to meet expectations, it can be widely disruptive.

In our homes and personal affairs, we try to plan for the continued well-being of those who survive a death, be they a business partner, a domestic partner or dependent child. The aim is to reduce the disruption caused by the death of a loved one and to support the re-establishment of a survivor. Similarly, as members of St Mark's, we might consider whether our legacy to this parish should continue through a financial contribution to maintain the ongoing sustainability of the Christian community of which we are a part.

And, while you make this contribution to the continuing activities of the St Mark's community, there are benefits for you the giver as well: these charitable contribution credits may reduce the tax payable either for your final tax return or for the estate tax return filed following death. Estate returns include the income from death benefits, dispositions of

property investment accounts, retirement funds and life insurance payable to the estate after death. I was surprised to learn that these revenues cannot access the personal deductions available on your annual return. So, a gift in a will to a charitable organization such as St Mark's is a strategy that may help reduce the overall rate of taxes payable. The gift would be included in your will and paid by your estate representative as a part of the administration of your estate.

Financial planners can help you with this type of planning consideration. Your legal advisor can also help prepare an estate plan to include specific gifts of property or cash to the Church.


> When you are gone, you will be missed, but your legacy giving to St Mark's will allow you to continue to support programs and initiatives which were important to your Christian life.

# Answering the Call: Could I do more ?

The lazy hazy days of summer are behind us, and if you are like me, my To Do list is growing. After the summer lull we find ourselves gearing up for all sorts of activities, meetings and other commitments. How do we answer the call to volunteer more? Perhaps a better question is, *should* we answer the call to do more? Our time is a fixed element. Take a look at how you spend your time. The following chart is an approximation of my typical day. As you can see, there is very little time to spare for "more".



We know that this representation is not exact, and everyone's chart will look different. But there will be one similarity: "spare" time, the time you don't have set aside for something, is minimal and, in most cases, is filled with the stuff we forgot, or special projects.

#### Answering (cont)

For me, balance has become one of the most important elements of managing just how much I do. If I were to show you a chart from just six months ago, there would have been only eating, sleeping and taking care of my parents. There was no time for the other stuff, or so it seemed. The only way I could volunteer was to sacrifice time in other areas. I achieved balance after we got some help caring for my parents.

After making this arrangement, one of the first things I addressed was my time with God. That Study/Meditation segment calmed my inner turmoil and allowed me to focus on priorities - both my own and what I envisioned God wanted me to do. That time with my thoughts and with God allowed me to set priorities and helped me determine if I should or should not do more and still maintain balance.

Each one of us must make our own decision to answer the call to do more. Please take some of that precious time to sit with yourself and with God to discern if you can do more.

**Budget in good shape:** After the first 6 months of 2018, St Mark's was in good shape financially.

Collections income was very close to what was budgeted and also close to the 2017 end-of-June figure. User fees were ahead of expected due to some renters who prefer to pay well in advance. Directed income was high, mainly because of the money raised for Cornerstone both through Lenten Outreach and fundraising activities.

Our expenditures were a little under what was expected, particularly for electricity, repair and upgrade, special projects and programs. However, these will likely catch up to the budgeted amounts in the next few months.

If things continue for the rest of the year as they have for the first 6 months, we should finish 2018 well. We count on you to keep up the good work!


Our first breakfast after the summer break will be held on




# What's in our Parish Library



# Patricia Hutton





On June 8, 2018, St Mark's own Patricia Hutton saw the launch of her first CD – *Late Bloomer* – with a small reception in the church hall. The CD shows the range of her mellow alto voice interpreting the big band songs of Kern & Hammerstein, Gershwin, Porter and Rodgers & Hart, and Patricia dedicated it to "all the women who, having reached a certain

age, still believe there is time to do great things".

Patricia has been singing all her life, including a few years in St Mark's choir, but had never performed as a solo artist, following what she calls a disastrous debut on the piano as a 6-year-old. It took the perseverance and encouragement of one person – Roxanne Goodman – to make her believe in her ability. She began studying voice with Roxanne, known in her work as the 'confidence booster', and as Patricia notes on her CD, Roxanne became her "teacher, mentor and friend; she saw that I had a dream and she made it come true". Patricia also thanked the members of the Sunset Singers, the choir founded by Roxanne that she joined in 2009, for their support and encouragement.

On July 18, 2018, the parish lost a friend – former parishioner, chorister and parish secretary, Norma Mellon.

Music was a major part of Norma's life, especially singing. She joined our church choir during the Fred Graham and John Phair years. She also sang with the Canadian Centennial Choir, Cantata Singers of Ottawa, the National Arts Centre Opera Chorus and, since 1987, with St Barnabas A & M, directed by former chorister Wesley Warren.

Long-time parishioners will remember Norma, who was parish secretary and office administrator from 1980 to 2004. Her service spanned the incumbencies of four parish priests - David Stalter, Gordon Worden, David Lethbridge and Roger Steinke.

We are grateful for the gifts that Norma shared with us during her tenure at St Mark's. We have her to thank for St Mark's Jublice Hymn, which she composed in 1999 to commemorate our 50 years as a parish. Rest in peace, dear friend. ML
