We were heartened to see a young person with a family come on board in the form of Rev Jessica, whom many of us had known as a young child of the rectory at St Mark's. We had great hopes

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


after our visioning exercise in April of 2018. Unfortunately, due to her serious health issues. Jessica was unable to walk that road with us.

wondered who could possibly replace him and help us along




Fr Julian Campbell arrived November 1, to become our full time incumbent.



I was born and raised on Cat Island, Bahamas. It is there that I was baptized and confirmed at St Andrew's Anglican

Church, Arthur's Town. Upon completion of high school, I journeyed to Nassau, the capital of The Bahamas.

In Nassau, my involvement deepened by being involved in renewal movements, youth ministry and lay ministry. Simultaneously, I studied at the College of the Bahamas which qualified me to be a Trained Teacher of Language Arts.

After years of contemplation, I tested my vocation to the sacred priesthood in



2004 at Codrington Anglican Theological College and the University of the West Indies, Barbados. At the culmination of studies, I worked in the dioceses of North Eastern Caribbean and Aruba, Barbados and Bahamas. Working in these dioceses were rewarding. It afforded me the opportunity to exercise honed skills by alternating between lecturing and being in parish ministry.



Many years ago, when Fr Gordon Worden was a young priest new to St Marks, he saw a need for our pastoral care team to have a more formal arrangement with the Perley Hospital on Aylmer Avenue. With this new plan, our team would visit in the hospital on Thursdays, and then on Fridays would help in a Eucharistic service. His wife Leslie played her accordion,

and took their daughter Jessica along.



On one morning, our resident dance/seniors fitness instructor, Lionel Doonan, taught steps to enthusiastic attendees. In mid-October, Martha Greatrex and her assistant Carol held the above-mentioned Instant Pot demonstration to a very interested group of 35.



On October 24, from the Bytown Dog Obedience Club, the dog demonstration team of nine dogs entertained, amused and interacted with a delighted group of 45 people.

October 31st was, of course, Halloween, with activities and clever disguises. The CCC regulars and newcomers, some 38 in all, got into the spirit and all were treated to a display of amazing costumes - witches, cats, Dracula, Jack Sparrow the pirate and even two Queens, Elizabeth I and the Queen Mother. People got prizes and enjoyed some scary stories and poems. Each week the number of community and regional attendees grows.



In late November, a speaker from the Council on Aging brings a presentation on "Walking Safely in Winter" and in December, Christmas music and "Christmas Joy", a morning singalong with Joy Bowerman and St Mark's choir members, our last day on December 19, will take us into the holiday season.

We are pleased to submit the preliminary report from the recently completed Fall financial stewardship campaign, Vision 2020.

This is an analysis of completed forms that were submitted. A tallying of the actual pledged amounts is now under way and will be combined with current givings of identifiable givers. This data will be reported later by the Envelope Secretary to Parish Council.

Thirty completed forms were submitted, compared to 34 from the previous campaign. Of these 30, 18 were submitted by parishioners who had previously submitted pledges in each of the previous campaigns, and seven were received from individuals who had never before participated. One new person signed up with PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance), and nine current PAR contributors elected to increase their commitments.

We suggest it would be useful to keep copies of the program documentation from Vision 2020 on hand, and offered them to new parishioners as they sign up to become members of the parish.
