Who was Titus Brandsma?

Titus Brandsma O.Carm (born Anno Sjoerd Brandsma; 23 February 1881 – 26 July 1942) was a Dutch Carmelite friar, Catholic priest and professor of philosophy. Brandsma was vehemently opposed to Nazi ideology and spoke out against it many times before the Second World War. He was imprisoned at the Dachau concentration camp, where he was murdered. He was beatified by the Catholic Church in November 1985 a martyr of the faith and canonized as a saint on 15 May 2022 by Pope Francis.

After the invasion of the Netherlands by the Third Reich in May 1940, Brandsma's longterm fight against the spread of Nazi ideology and for educational and press freedom brought him to the attention of the Nazis.

In January 1942 he undertook to deliver by hand a letter from the Conference of Dutch Bishops to the editors of Catholic newspapers in which the bishops ordered them not to print official Nazi documents, as was required under a new law by the German occupiers. He had visited fourteen editors before being arrested on 19 January at the Boxmeer monastery.

After being held prisoner in Scheveningen, Amersfoort, and Cleves, Brandsma was transferred to the Dachau concentration camp, arriving there on 19 June. His health quickly gave way, and he was transferred to the camp hospital. He died on 26 July 1942, from a lethal injection administered by a nurse of the Allgemeine SS, as part of their program of medical experimentation on the prisoners.

To Yvonne Temple-Vermeulen, he represents and is the saint of the Free Press.

In 1942 he was killed in Dachau during the war because he refused to be silenced. That is a bravery that many journalists face today.

Yvonne's family in The Netherlands, personally benefited from the handouts of food and his generosity in a time (1930's) when poverty was very high in Europe, just before the war started in 1940.

Her father would have been very happy to have his good works recognized by canonization.

How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? 1 John 3:17 Across Ontario, many people are suffering marginalization and social isolation. Their suffering increases when they are homeless or lack safe and affordable housing

Housing people makes sound economic sense. It reduces health care, social service and justice system costs. It is cheaper to develop safe, affordable, permanent homes than to pay the high social costs that result from housing insecurity.

Anglicans are partnering with government, private sector and local groups to address this crisis. We are on the front line of developing innovative affordable housing solutions. Anglicans are making safe and affordable homes a reality through direct financial support and repurposing of church property.

- What will you/your government do to end homelessness in Ontario?
- What is your/your government's plan to create truly affordable rental housing?
- How will you/your government address the rising cost of homeownership?

In-person Services

- 8 am and 10 am services have resumed.
- The far right side of the church will be maintained as distanced seating for those who feel more comfortable that way. The left side and middle of the church will have no distancing requirement.
- Anyone with COVID symptoms should assume that they have the virus and stay home
- Provide proof of double vaccination, if you have not shown it to us before. Booster shots are strongly encouraged.
- Masks must be worn when you enter the building and throughout the service, except when taking communion. Three-layer, medical or N95 masks are encouraged.
- Come warmly dressed since some windows will be open to improve ventilation.
- All leaders in the service, readers, LACs and choir must show proof of triple vaccination.
