
### Slim & Trim

## Creation Season

Christians around the world are invited to give particular attention to praying and caring for God's creation as part of the global Season of Creation, observed from September 1 to October 4 every year. General Synod 2019 passed a resolution adopting the Season of Creation in the Anglican Church of Canada as a time of prayer, education, and action and encouraging dioceses and parishes to participate.

### **Musings on Creation Season**

I have an educational background of Ecology. I did my Masters at UBC looking at zooplankton communities in one of the freshwater lakes in the UBC Research Forest. I started a PhD at the University of Toronto but parted ways with my supervisor before I finished. I am also a cradle Anglican who has sung in a church choir since I was 13, except for the 3 years when I was in Toronto. For several years, a field course from Carleton University was using Patterson Lake, where the Bowerman family cottage is located, as part of their field course. I was asked by the Lake Association if I would be willing to go out on the lake with the students in the field course to be their "local guide", so to speak. I would always introduce myself and ask each of the students to introduce themselves and tell me why they were taking the course, so if there was something of particular interest to

them, I could make sure that they saw it. One of the questions I was often asked when they found out what I did was, how do you reconcile your background with your job? Isn't the church against all that sort of stuff. The last time I went out with the course was 2019 and I was very pleased to answer that the head of the Anglican Church of Canada had just made Creation Season a national priority and even before then, care of creation had been added to our baptismal vows.

# Will you strive to safeguard the integrity of God's creation, and respect, sustain and renew the life of the Earth?

The greatest threat to creation at this time, I think, is the shift in paradigm required to go forward. What is a paradigm? A paradigm is a widely accepted example, belief or concept. In the case in point, the paradigm we were brought up with is that the earth is there for our use. It is an infinite resource and we can take what we want without consequences.

There are certainly biblical references that have reinforced this belief. In fact, this mindset comes from the Judaeo-Christian tradition. In the story of creation, we are told:

"God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food. And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds in the sky and all the creatures that move along the ground—everything that has the breath of life in it—I give every green plant for food." And it was so." *GENESIS 1: 28-30* 

This theme is echoed in the psalms:

When I consider your heavens,

the work of your fingers,

the moon and the stars,

which you have set in place,

what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?

You have made them a little lower than the angels and crowned them with glory and honor. You made them rulers over the works of your hands; you put everything under their feet: all flocks and herds, and the animals of the wild, the birds in the sky, and the fish in the sea, all that swim the paths of the seas. Lord. our Lord.

how majestic is your name in all the earth! PSALM 8:3-9

To a people where the world was a hostile and threatening place with vast expanses of land, this would have seemed very comforting and sustaining. But, as with many things from that time, perhaps the time has come to put it in a modern context. While God is always with us, how we understand our heritage changes as the context of our lives change. Certainly, we no longer think we should be sacrificing in our temples. Yet the paradigm that the earth is ours to subdue informs our thinking to a large extent.

In searching the internet for creation collects, it was difficult to find a collect which truly reflected the vow "safeguarding the integrity of God's creation, and respect, sustain and renew the life of the Earth"

It is not difficult to understand why. People who enter the priesthood have a deep spiritual connection to God and a great desire to help and guide people. In general, most do not have a background in science or environmental studies. Some of the collects tie care for creation to the welfare of people in a causal relationship, ie we need to care for creation so that all people can be fed. Others talk about caring for all living things, which is great as far as it goes, but care for creation also means caring for the water and the air and the rocks, which are not living things. I realized that these collects were grounded and rooted in the belief that the earth is there to serve us.

What role can the church play in creation care? If we want to continue as a human race, loving and serving God, it is time to shift our view of creation. We must regard ourselves as stewards of creation, not lords over creation but part of creation. The quote from David Suzuki above, spoke deeply to me about this shift in thinking. We must realize that the way we have treated creation stems from the same root as colonialism and other abuses and as we continue to try to acknowledge our heritage there, we must also acknowledge our heritage on the treatment of creation and look for a new way forward.

God of unchangeable power, when you fashioned the world the morning stars sang together and the host of heaven shouted for joy; open our eyes to the wonders of creation and teach us to see all things for good, to the honor of your glorious name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


### Coffee and Conversation Fall Program

### Changes to COVID restrictions

The diocese entered into the Green stage of the Pandemic plan on June 1. In its communiqué, it states "It's increasingly clear the pandemic is not going away any time soon and entering the Green stage, rather than just saying "we're back to normal", is an important symbol that we are still operating under the pandemic plan—and an acknowledgment that restrictions could increase again if the virus resurges (as it has the two previous falls, after more open summers)." At St Mark's, we will stay in modified yellow (status quo) during the month of June with some gradual changes throughout the month.

- Masks are still required until further notice.
- No Proof of Vaccine required to enter the church as of June 5
- The table at the front of the nave will be removed June 12 and Communion will be administered at the rail. Distance must be maintained.
- The Peace is status quo until further notice.
- ¼ of the nave will remain with "distancing tape" until further notice.

We can accept e-transfers to the main church account. We cannot do autodeposit because of the type of account but you may e-transfer money to <u>stmarks@stmarksottawa.ca</u>. You will be required to give a question. Please either make the answer obvious or email the office and let them know the answer to the question. This option has no cost to the church.
