#### **Great Antiphons of Advent**

This year at the beginning of the 10 am services we have been hearing some of the Great Antiphons of Advent. (An antiphon is a short sentence sung or recited before or after a psalm or canticle.) These date from the 6<sup>th</sup> century in Italy and were originally used before the Magnificat in the 7 days preceding Christmas. They are also known as the O antiphons because each of them begins

with O. There are references to the antiphons in numerous Advent materials. The Advent litany uses the O antiphons, but probably the most well known is the hymn O Come, O Come Emmanuel. If you are listening to the 10 am service, you will hear a solo voice singing the original Latin antiphon followed by everyone singing the corresponding verse from O Come, O Come Emmanuel.

#### Magnificat

This Sunday the musical theme running through the service is the Magnificat.

The Magnificat (Canticle 18 in the BAS) or the Song of Mary or in the Byzantine tradition the Ode of the Theotokos is taken from the Gospel of Luke. Magnificat is the first word of the Latin version which begins Magnificat Anima Mea Dominum, My soul magnifies the Lord. The words are spoken by Mary while visiting her cousin Elizabeth who is pregnant with John the Baptist. Elizabeth praises Mary for her faith (using words partially reflected in the Hail Mary), and Mary responds with what is now known as the Magnificat.

The Magnificat is one of the eight most ancient Christian hymns and in Western Christianity is sung at the main evening service while in Eastern Christianity, it is sung at the morning service.

There is some scholarly discussion of whether the historical Mary herself actually proclaimed these words. The canticle echoes several biblical passages, but the most pronounced allusions are to the Song of Hannah, from the Books of Samuel (1 Samuel 2:1–10).

Although the gospel of Luke is believed to be originally written in Greek, the text has been translated and interpreted many times. This Sunday morning, we will hear three different interpretations of this ancient hymn. First chanted as a traditional Anglican psalm using the words from the Book of Common Prayer. Then as the offertory hymn from Common

Praise with words written in 1962 and again as the communion anthem from Sing a New Creation with words written in 1990. As well, both the prelude and postlude are based on the Magnificat.

#### **COVID Communique from the Diocese**

Respiratory viruses in Ontario and Quebec are sending young children to emergency rooms at double or triple the usual rate due to a combination of the highly contagious RSV, COVID-19, and influenza. It is a situation that calls for a response by all who care for the vulnerable in our midst. Throughout the pandemic, our response to the reality of public health concerns has been science-based, and this latest challenge must be met the same way.

Last month we implemented the requirement of masks for those in liturgical leadership. Masks are an effective tool for combating respiratory viruses as well as the flu.

Keeping that in mind, we ask each congregation to:

- ask people to stay home when they are symptomatic
- strongly encourage mask-wearing
- have masks available for those who forgot theirs
- encourage people to wear masks during coffee time
- encourage COVID boosters and flu shots

#### Bible Study

This past Fall we didn't have any Bible Study. This was due to the fact that many of us were involved in the reconstruction of the parish's Pastoral Care Team. As a result, people who are still doing the Ottawa Pastoral Care Counselling course (which is mandatory) each week. I will be on vacation from 16th

#### **Mince Tarts**




#### Pàidhean mions (Pie-en mince)

How are things?

We're not sure about you, but we've been very busy in the kitchen baking lots of delicious things this week! And we're sure there are plenty of others doing the same. That scone hidden in your drawer came from somewhere, didn't it?

There's a reason we call them 'mince' pies. In the past, people used to make them mostly with mutton, but also with beef, pork, rabbit and venison. When they were first eaten at large gatherings in the middle ages, they were filled with a mixture of mutton, fruit and preserving liquid. Today, mince pies look very different, and there's no meat in the mixture anymore. However, it's when we look back that we realize that their connection to Christmas time hasn't changed.





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In days gone by, the mince would be prepared along with the Christmas pudding on the last Sunday before Advent. To spread the joy, it was a tradition down in England that everyone would participate in the baking. And if people wanted to be sure of good health and happiness in the year ahead, they had to eat mince pies every day for the twelve days of Christmas! .

As we know, mince pies are as popular today as ever, and very often, we save one or two for a special old man who is very famous! Why not try making some in your own kitchen?
