#### Spend an hour in prayer

In earlier years at St Mark's, at the end of the Maundy Thursday service the elements of bread and wine were carried in a solemn procession from the main church into the Peace Chapel where they remained until the Good Friday service the following day. For much of the time, those elements were faithfully attended by parishioners who signed up to stay in the chapel an hour at a time through the night. The practice echoed the hours in the Garden of Gethsemane when Iesus praved for strength to face his death, after asking his disciples to wait with him. "Could you not watch with me one hour?" he asked when he found them asleep (Matt.26:40).

As one who participated in this yearly vigil, I can say the experience was profound; sitting in silence in the darkened chapel with one candle flickering, praying, singing hymns quietly, listening and thinking about Jesus and what He did for us. It always seemed too soon

when I heard the sound of the next person arriving to take my place.

The pandemic changed all that, but the vigil has continued in an altered format. For health reasons at first, and now also for security reasons, it seems better for us to spend our time in prayer at home instead of in the Peace Chapel. We have tried to cover all the hours through the night by asking participants to sign up for their chosen hour on the poster in the Link. The continuity of prayer throughout the night is a desirable sacrifice that St Mark's could offer as part of our Lenten observance. Please consider being part of this activity. You will find the poster in the Link with spaces for each hour from 9 pm to 7 am.

#### Stewardship

This week we enter the last portion of Lent. This Sunday sees us welcome Jesus as a king and end with the crucifixion. This has been quite the 40 days. The beginning of Lent we took time on Ash Wednesday to reflect on what we would be doing during Lent. Was it giving up that second cup of coffee, chocolate or less time on social media? Or perhaps it was taking on new things, reading scripture, singing, contemplation or just quiet time of reflection and prayer. Whatever we did or did not do we did it with a focus on our journey through Lent.

For myself, reading and studying my daily reflections and contemplation took on an expanded role as I faithfully followed Lent Madness. Lent Madness was a like watching the playoffs but instead of teams we had a group of 32 Saints and famous religious people. Each day during Lent we learned about their lives, their contributions and yes

even the kitschy merchandise that was associated with them. Each one had great things to recommend them, each story a reflection of how they responded to God's love and generosity. Lives of sacrifice, lives of dedication and lives well lived in the presence of God.

What came to me was how each person was inspired to give of themselves, in some cases their lives. for their belief in God. I asked myself what else can I do? Volunteer more, pray more, get involved more or just give more of everything. I guess for me it was a little bit of all these things.



I encourage you to take some time to reflect on your Lenten journey. Have you been inspired by your Lenten practice. Did you feel closer to God in anything that you did or did not do? Have you though about what you can do to support God's generosity here on earth. Can you help just a little more?

At our annual vestry we voted that our Lenten offerings would include Beyond Ottawa, a program designed to provide safe spaces that connect people and create community. It offers programs addressing basic needs and fostering dignity, wellness and hope for all. The second is the Diocese of Jerusalem, we all have read and seen the devastation in Gaza which falls within the diocese and the need to provide immediate aid and funds to rebuild infrastructure. And we cannot forget the work of the PWRDF and of our own St. Mark's outreach.

As we approach the ultimate sacrifice that God gave us through his Son Jesus Christ let us pause and consider if we can be generous just a little bit more.

## Guidelines for a Harmonious and Respectful Environment

These Guidelines are based on the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa's Workplace Violence and Harassment Policy as approved May 2021 and are in compliance with the Occupational Health and Safety Act.

For the purpose of the policy, workplace violence and harassment can occur anyplace where church business and related activities occur. This includes in the church or on church property, at church related social functions, on social media, emails, telephone conversations related to church business and outside church property in the course of church business.

We need to recognize that some situations are not considered harassment including venting feelings of minor discontent, disagreements or interpersonal conflicts, and foolish words where the harm is fleeting. If you disagree with someone, stick to the topic under discussion without casting aspersions on the person's character

Emails facilitate communication at the speed of light. It is therefore important to note that emails are a permanent and public record and senders must be comfortable with the contents of the email. When sending emails, be aware that an inappropriate tone can damage professional relationships and may result in misinterpretation of your message. Ask yourself if your email adheres to the guidelines for a harmonious and respectful environment. If it does not, then do not send it.

#### **GUIDELINES**

 Treat others with kindness and respect in a manner free of derogatory or degrading remarks or gestures.

- 2. Be aware that non-verbal communication such as body language can be intimidating
- 3. Do not engage in sexist, racist, ethnic, gender, ageist, and other jokes that may cause embarrassment
- 3. Empathize with others and recognize their contributions
- 4. Be courteous and listen to what others are saying
- 5. Treat everyone fairly and equitably
- 6. Apologize willingly and sincerely to people you may have offended
- 7. Recognize and value diversity in the workplace
- 8. Remember that everyone's opinion is important
- 9. Communicate positively and practice collaborative working relationships
- 10. Engage in politeness and professionalism Be aware that non-verbal communication such as body language can be intimidating

- Apple sauce and puddings in individual sizes Granola bars, prepackaged cookies e.g. bear paws
- No Name cheese packets with crackers, pretzels or breadsticks

- Loblaws and Costco gift cards used to buy fresh fruit and vegetables, buns, bagels, cream cheese and cold cuts.
- Brown lunch bags and plastic sandwich bags (not fold-over.)
