

last few years. It was the generosity of the St Mark's community to Algonquin College Spiritual Centre, where she then worked, that brought them together as they partnered to offer English classes and snacks to Ukrainians who were fleeing the war that began in February 2022.

Originally from St. Vincent & the Grenadines, Yolande immigrated to Canada over forty years ago, and initially settling in Winnipeg. It was there that she honed her passion for community work as she became involved in Winnipeg's vibrant Black community. After marrying and moving east, she and her late husband continued serving the Black community in Montreal and then Ottawa.


New Black History Month Vestments.

New Black History Month vestments for St Mark's were blessed last Sunday. The vestments were designed and sewn by Joy Bowerman, with fabric help provided by Janis Perkin and Penny Miller.

Here are my (Joy's) notes on the design of the vestments:

I wanted to capture the beauty, strength, diversity and resilience of Black people and to reflect the Black Diaspora in Canada. In Canada, there is a long history of black quilting, both from the loyalists that came to Nova Scotia and those who came to Canada by the Underground Railway. In Nova Scotia, there are areas where the quilts are mostly strip pieced, which is what I used on the front of the chasuble.





In the fabrics, there are 3 black history month fabrics which Janis had. I found some African prints on line and serendipitously chose a fabric typical of Ghana, and three fabrics which are reminiscent of the Ivory coast. I chose rich coloured solids some of which came from Penny to coordinate with the prints – one of which has tulips on it, in my mind, for Ottawa.

There is folklore which tells of quilts being hung on the line or in windows with particular blocks used as a code for slaves escaping on the underground railway. This is has not been verified, and there are many who actively dispute it. However, on the bottom of the stole, you will see a small log cabin quilt block. The log cabin block is a very old quilt pattern and the quilting community at the terminus of the underground railway made a log cabin quilt for their minister in the 1860s. In the stories, this block was used to tell travellers that they were in a safe place.

Coffee, Company & Conversation

At CCC Thursday morning, Bruce Deachman, "intrepid reporter", senior writer and columnist for the Ottawa Citizen, shared stories and personal experiences about Ottawa. His informal talk was entertaining, fun and very informative. He had everyone's attention while he told of newspaper stories he's pursued and written over 30 years of reporting about our city. Notably, he shared about the book that he wrote and curated from Citizen archives, to celebrate the 175th anniversary of the newspaper. "Front Page Ottawa" was put together by Bruce to highlight the many important, routine and

sometimes very bizarre happenings that took place in the Ottawa area over the 175 years of the Ottawa Citizen's existence. In 1845 it was called "The Packet", and over the years, the paper reported on such events as the Titanic disaster in 1912, the Ottawa Senators' Stanley Cup win in 1923, Elvis Presley and the Heron Road Bridge collapse among many, many others. His writings of these reports which make up the book, are fascinating. He read several of the more amusing and/or "bizarre" tales to a rapt audience of 50. It was a delightful morning with a warm and engaging "historical" local journalist who had a number of people wanting to talk with him after his presentation.



The morning treats, along with tea/coffee, were delicious - oat squares, raspberry squares, tea biscuits, and other sweets, plus crackers, cheese and fruit - always healthy snacks at CCC. Many thanks to Gillian and Penny, this week's baking duo.

A Lenten Journey in the Holy Land

St George's College, Jerusalem is one of our two Lenten Outreach charities.

Violence and uncertainty have created a major crisis for St. George's College Jerusalem, an integral part of the ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

The College normally draws many pilgrims to the Land of the Holy One, and many local Palestinians provide services and goods to pilgrims. The College enables pilgrims to see, feel, and understand the biblical and contemporary richness of the land and the Christians, Jews, and Muslims who live there. It is wholly committed to building awareness and dialogue through pilgrimage, education, and by arranging encounters between different groups of people to promote reconciliation.

The College's earned revenue from pilgrims' fees, gift shop sales, and other lodging fee has been totally disrupted, and there are insufficient funds to provide already-reduced salaries for the College's staff and essential operations in 2025. The situation is dire for the remaining staff and their families, and for the future of the College itself.

Let Light Shine: The Canadian Campaign for St. George's College Jerusalem is an appeal to friends of the College in Canada. It will run until the end of April 2025. The Campaign objective is to raise \$250,000 from Canadian friends of St. George's College Jerusalem, to provide funds for paying reduced staff salaries and related operations in 2025.

In this time of alarming tension and restrictions, the College has adapted with creativity and resilience. The Dean and remaining staff have produced videos for virtual pilgrimages, developed future curricula, and continue to maintain the facility.

During Lent, we invite parishes to benefit from an excellent six-week video/study program prepared by the Staff of the College, called <u>A Lenten Journey in the Holy Land</u>.
