with love on Mothering Sunday – March 30, 2025

In the Anglican Church, Mothering Sunday is the 4th Sunday in Lent. Through the years, that Sunday became the one festive day in Lent, including an annual pilgrimage to the Mother Church of the Diocese, the Cathedral. As they processed they sang the ancient psalms

of Ascent from the times when Jews processed to the Temple in Jerusalem. As time went by the Cathedrals were overcrowded, and the festivals were moved to the local Parish churches.

Older children and adults often worked away from home, but on this Sunday they were allowed to go home to their mothers, and families would be reunited. Going home often entailed long walks along paths where they would gather spring flowers. Those in 'service' would also bring fruit and nuts and other food for the family gathering. Flowers and special Simnel cake became part of the celebration.

When Mothers' Union started in England in 1876, Mothering Sunday was revived and encouraged as a family-oriented festival. MU came to Canada in 1888 and Mothering Sunday came with it.

Although Mothering Sunday is not a normal part of the Anglican Church of Canada, many parishes who have a Mothers' Union branch, like St Mark's, still celebrate the 4th Sunday in Lent - Mothering Sunday, which is also when Mothers' Day is celebrated in Britain. St Mark's present MU branch was started by a group of young mothers in 1983. Its focus is on the family and has continued the tradition of Mothering Sunday by serving Simnel cake, and providing flowers to all the women in the church. (not gathered by the wayside!)

We know that the Simnel cake and flowers were a special part of our Mothering Sunday coffee hours in the past. So in 2024, we are offering Simnel cake and a flower. Please join us on Sunday and enjoy a coffee or tea with us before you leave.


Spring Market

Coffee, Company & Conversation

Thursday's guest at Coffee, Company and Conversation was Akiko Sakiyama, a professional decluttering and home organizing specialist. She is trained in the Kondo Method (Marie Kondo), and thus shared the result of bringing joy into one's home and life through a focused approach to decluttering and culling in order to be more highly organized in one's living. Through a series of slides she asked direct questions regarding the material items that one keeps and holds onto for a variety of reasons, that in fact clutter and overwhelm our lives. In dealing with the purging and reorganizing that most people want to do (if they have not done so already), the act of self questioning and also mindfulness (attention to the moment and how one feels, then responding and taking action) becomes a part of the exercise. Beyond the discussion, Akiko displayed very effectively how one can fold and store clothing in a very efficient way. That was enlightening. Akiko's presentation was an example of highly efficient organization.



In addition, there was a lucky draw, and two people each won a one hour "in home consultation" with Akiko. It was a morning of learning and self reflection regarding how to live in a more peaceful and joyful way.



The food accompanying coffee and tea was delicious as usual. This week's bakers prepared two kinds of muffins, two types of loaves, lovely cookies, several types of cheeses and pate to go with crackers, as well as a tray of fruit. Many thanks to Gillian and Penny. We appreciate our bakers!

The Debra Dynes Family House was very grateful for our contributions this past week. They appreciated our focus on pasta, tuna and tinned milk, as well as all other donations..

I copied the following from their website newsletter to give everyone a better picture of all the ways that the Debra Dynes Family House helps the community. Being new as the Outreach Coordinator, I thought St Mark's parishioners might find it as interesting as I did.

"After a very hectic holiday season, we distributed toys to 241 children and vouchers/ hampers to over 364 families.

Our annual City report showed that in 2024 we responded 51,120 times for requests for help, we assisted 5,415 unique individuals and distributed over \$586,318.42 worth of food through our Food Bank.

While continuing all our regular programs and services, including tax preparation, we were certainly ready for a change in focus for March Break!

Thanks to a generous donation from the disbursement of St. Brigid's Summer Camp funds, we were able to make sure that our community children were out and about in the city."

A Lenten Journey in the Holy Land

St George's College, Jerusalem is one of our two Lenten Outreach charities.

Violence and uncertainty have created a major crisis for St. George's College Jerusalem, an integral part of the ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

The College normally draws many pilgrims to the Land of the Holy One, and many local Palestinians provide services and goods to pilgrims. The College enables pilgrims to see, feel, and understand the biblical and contemporary richness of the land and the Christians, Jews, and Muslims who live there. It is wholly committed to building awareness and dialogue through pilgrimage, education, and by arranging encounters between different groups of people to promote reconciliation.

The College's earned revenue from pilgrims' fees, gift shop sales, and other lodging fee has

been totally disrupted, and there are insufficient funds to provide already-reduced salaries for the College's staff and essential operations in 2025. The situation is dire for the remaining staff and their families, and for the future of the College itself.

Let Light Shine: The Canadian Campaign for St. George's College Jerusalem is an appeal to friends of the College in Canada. It will run until the end of April 2025. The Campaign objective is to raise \$250,000 from Canadian friends of St. George's College Jerusalem, to provide funds for paying reduced staff salaries and related operations in 2025.

In this time of alarming tension and restrictions, the College has adapted with creativity and resilience. The Dean and remaining staff have produced videos for virtual pilgrimages, developed future curricula, and continue to maintain the facility.

During Lent, we invite parishes to benefit from an excellent six-week video/study program prepared by the Staff of the College, called <u>A Lenten Journey in the Holy Land</u>.
